

319 DANZIG DAM & HAILSTONE CREEK WATERSHED



The Morton County 319 Danzig Dam & Hailstone Creek Watershed Project provides technical, financial and educational assistance to agriculture producers and landowners within the watershed.

Some of the eligible Best Management Practices (BMP's) are: Pasture/Hay land Plantings, Permitted Feedlots, Partial Manure Management, Cover Crops, Water Developments and Cross-Fencing.

Through the Morton County 319 Danzig Dam and Hailstone Creek Watershed Project, producers and landowners will be provided 60% in cost-share dollars for BMP's. Involvement in the program is completely voluntary. There is over \$480,000 in funding available to producers and landowners.

Nannyberry (Virburnum lentago)

Nannyberry (Virburnum lentago) is a native tree-like shrub, found in wooded areas. Growing up to 14' tall and 12' wide, the Nannyberry has beautiful glossy leaves, which turn to a vibrant red in the Autumn. Creamy white flowers in the Spring turn into fruit clustered in drupes. The fruit is bluish-black when mature with a pulpy sweet taste. They can be eaten fresh or processed into jams and jellies. The Nannyberry is adapted to wide variety of soils, but does not do well in drought conditions. It grows best in full sun but will do well in partial shade, making an excellent choice for an understory shrub. Hardy to Zone 2, Nannyberry is an excellent choice for a shrub row in windbreak, or as a fruit producing shrub.

EQIP Planning For 2020



The Morton County NRCS office is working with the Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP) and is excited to initiate the planning first method this upcoming planning season. The "Planning First" method allows the producer to gain a better understanding of what is happening on their land, use the tools and expertise that NRCS can provide for their operation to make reasonable planning decisions and create a conservation plan that suites the needs of not only the producer, but the land for the generations to come. Please note that the planning process should start a year prior to installing conservation practices as we are planning for the 2020 funding pools. SCHOLARSHIP



The Morton County Soil Conservation District has established a scholarship opportunity for high school seniors and/or college students that are residents of Morton County, North Dakota. The applicant(s) must intend to or currently be pursuing a degree in an agricultural/natural resource management/environmental or related field at a two or four year accredited college or university. Multiple scholarships, each totaling up to \$500, may be awarded.

Interested applicants are required to complete the application form and compose an essay of no more than 500 words on **one** of the topics chosen by the Morton County SCD. These topics can be found our webpage at mcscd.com. Applicants will need to maintain at least a 2.5 GPA and be a full time student. The scholarship award will be paid directly to the recipient after the Morton County SCD Board receives the previous semester transcript.

Applications and essays must be postmarked no later than <u>February 3rd, 2020</u>. Essays will be judged by the Morton County SCD Board and staff and the winner will be notified no later than March 13th, 2020. Application and topic information can be found on our website at mcscd.com.
