## Water Development



Water is an important, but often overlooked, nutrient. Livestock water requirements are affected by many factors, including size, productivity, diet, and environmental conditions. Good water quality and cleanliness can increase water intake and improve livestock production. An option to make your ranch or livestock operation more drought tolerant would be to develop a watering system utilizing a water well,

pump, rural water hook-up, pipelines, and water tanks. Studies have shown that beef cattle allowed free access to ponds and

dugouts have lower average daily gains in comparison with those provided water from the same water source to a trough.



Cattle also have greater risk of contracting illnesses from ponds and dugouts compared to drinking from a trough. There are multiple benefits to updating your livestock watering system.

## NRCS—Conservation Technical Assistance

The **Conservation Technical Assistance Program (CTA)** provides our local farmers and ranchers with the knowledge and tools they need to conserve, maintain, and restore the natural resources on their lands and improve the health of their operations for the future. NRCS offers this assistance at no cost to the producers we serve. Our goal is to give our customers personalized advice and information, based on the latest science and research, to help them make informed decisions.

A producer can choose to take the next step towards improving their operations, NRCS can work with them to develop a conservation plan, with suggested conservation practices that can help them reach their production and conservation goals.

They can also choose to apply for financial assistance to get help installing the conservation practices outlined in their conservation plan. Below are two common financial assistance programs.

### Environmental Quality Incentive Program

EQIP provides financial and technical assistance to agricultural producers to address natural resource concerns and deliver environmental benefits such as improved water and air quality, conserved ground and surface water, reduced soil erosion and sedimentation or improved or created wildlife habitat.

### Conservation Stewardship Program

The Conservation Stewardship Program helps agricultural producers maintain and improve their existing

conservation systems and adopt additional conservation activities to address priority resources concerns. Participants earn CSP payments for conservation performance—the higher the performance, the higher the payment.

## **Colorado Blue Spruce**

Colorado Blue Spruce is a medium to tall evergreen used for farmstead and field windbreak purposes. It gets its name from the bluish color which is a result of a white powder deposited on the needles. It has a slow to medium growing rate and is very broad and dense with stiff branches horizontal to



the ground. It is the most drought tolerant of the spruce species. The Blue Spruce has a wide spreading and moderately deep root system which helps it stand up to wind better than most spruce species. Not only is it a great nesting site for birds it also makes an excellent Christmas tree.
